## Highlights from March 17 Bird Walk to the South Platte and 74th Ave

Eleven of us had a great morning partaking of some urban birding along the South Platte just downstream from the Denver waste water treatment plant. The air smelled a bit peculiar, but the birds didn't seem to mind.


We had a good mix of ducks, with a single male Wood Duck perhaps being the highlight.

Another interesting duck was a first-year male Common Goldeneye (brown head, splotch of white by the bill, and mishmash of gray and white on the flanks). We had one challenging bird, which was either a female Common or Red-breasted Merganser, but when all we got to see was the rear end of a bird swimming away from us that complicated things.


One of the reasons for going to this particular stretch of river is that it seems to always have a few Black-crowned Night-Herons, and we were able to find five of them – a mix of adults and juveniles.

We had several views of a pair of courting Red-tailed Hawks – hanging out at the nest site together, perched side by side, and flying together. She was noticeably bigger, and in flight he was dropping his feet down – an invitation to lock talons as part of their courtship. We also saw a pair of American Kestrels hanging out side by side.

One of the real treats was the number of Yellowrumped Warblers we saw, though not in breeding plumage quite yet. Those which we got good enough

looks at to identify to sub-species appeared to all be Audubon's Warblers – plain head with relatively small pale throat (Myrtle Warblers have slightly darker ear patches, a pale eyebrow, and the pale throat is more extensive – wrapping around the side of the neck.


