## Highlights from Sept 12 Birding Trip to Prewitt Reservoir

## Prewitt Reservoir (c) Sibylle Hechtel

Prewitt Reservoir in northeastern Colorado was constructed just prior to World War I, and, when full, has a surface area of about 2400 acres. It is managed as a re-charge impoundment, meaning that outflows to the South Platte River are strategically timed to offset reduced river flow caused by aquifer pumping and irrigation of crops. Starting in the late 1950's and 1960's the many reservoirs along the South Platte gradually became part of the State Wildlife Areas program, providing opportunities for hunting, fishing, and other recreation, including great bird watching. During the current drought and irrigation season the reservoir has been drawn down significantly creating vast mudflats for migrating waterfowl. The reservoir and its inlet canal also have a substantial cottonwood gallery forest attractive to migratory and resident landbirds.

On Saturday our group started the morning in the forest along the inlet canal, then in late morning we did the mud trudge out to the current water's edge, and then wound things up in the early afternoon down below the dam. We had numerous landbird highlights including three species of raptors (Red-tailed Hawk, Swainson's Hawk, and American Kestrel), four species of woodpeckers (including Red-headed Woodpecker), seven species of flycatchers (including Olive-sided Flycatcher and Eastern Phoebe), two species of nuthatches, two species of wren (including Rock Wren), four species of sparrows, and eight species of warblers (including MacGillivray's Warbler, American Redstart, and Northern Parula). Additional fun birds included a Warbling Vireo, a group of Cedar Waxwings, and a Western Tanager. It was clearly evident that migration was in full swing, and except for a few of the raptors, woodpeckers, nuthatches, and sparrows most of these birds will continue to move south for the winter.

When we got out on to the mudflats we had a whole new suite of birds including three additional species of raptors (Osprey, Bald Eagle, and Peregrine Falcon), ten shorebird species (including Black-bellied Plover, Marbled Godwit, and Red-necked Phalarope), two gull species, two tern species (Black and Forester's), plus Double-crested Cormorants, American White Pelicans, Great Blue Herons, and Snowy Egrets.

Fall migration can be tricky for birders. There are many drably plumaged juveniles, many adults are not quite as brightly colored as they were a few weeks back, and there are some species that are a bit unfamiliar to us as we only see them in eastern Colorado during fall migration. However, as we found at Prewitt, there can be these waves of multiple species that are deliciously overwhelming. There's this bird, and that bird, and another bird over there, and it can just go on and on until you walk away exhausted but very fulfilled.
