And, then, here at the very end of February, we get teased with a bit of springtime-like weather.

But, there are some birdy activities that are not just teasers: Breeding season has begun, with reports from the lowlands of Bald Eagles and Great Horned Owls incubating, and House Finches carrying nesting material.

We are also starting to hear a change in some of the local Evergreen vocalizations: Red-shafted Flickers, White-breasted Nuthatches, Mountain Chickadees, and Gray-headed Juncos are all starting to work on their songs.

\* This just in from Larry White: At his recording station in the Upper Bear Creek watershed, there were 14 days with measurable precipitation plus 3 with just a trace, resulting in an all-time record for liquid precipitation for the month. Snowfall totals came in just under the record, in second place. As a result of the wet and snowy month, the 5-month water-year total to date is well above average.
