Highlights from July 6 Plant Walk to Beaver Meadows

Chuck Aid. July 10, 2021:



Green Bog Orchid (Chuck Aid)

Six of us took a very leisurely stroll up towards Beaver Meadows this past Saturday, and, in fact, it was so leisurely that we never made it to Beaver Meadows. We just kept finding too many fun plants that grabbed our attention. Had we made it to Beaver Meadows we might have seen such great flowers as Mariposa Lily, Parry's Harebell, Blue-eyed Grass, and Prairie Smoke, all species that like mountain meadows. However, we consoled ourselves by finding several other cool flowers that made up for the ones we missed.

The parking lot itself at Camp Rock Campground is hard to get out of because it's at such an abrupt ecotone (a habitat created by the juxtaposition of distinctly different habitats) between open meadow punctuated with aspen and mature riparian spruce-fir forest. I like to begin there by exploring what I call "roadside riparian," aka the ditch. Water runs off these hard road surfaces causing more moisture to be available in the ditch and generally results in more flowers in that area e.g., Blanket Flower, Black-eyed Susan, Fairy Trumpet, and Common Harebell. I always like

using the scientific name for Shrubby Cinquefoil as a nice example of why it's fun to embrace some of these binomials. When you look at the leaf it has five obvious leaflets, hence the genus name, *Pentaphylloides*, five-leafed, and then with the plant's always numerous flowers, the *floribunda* part makes perfect sense, abundant-flowers.

Moving into the shade of the dense, tall spruce growing along a tiny creek, we found many wonderful flowers, including Sweet Cicely, Tall Chiming Bells, Twistedstalk, Purple Avens, Brook Saxifrage, and Canada Violet. A real highlight was getting to see four species of Pyrolas – Wood Nymph, Green Pyrola, Pink Pyrola, and One-sided Pyrola. These members of the Pyrolaceae, or Wintergreen Family, are among my favorites. Generally, they grow in deeply shaded forests, and because they are not very tall, and their blossoms hang downward, they can be easily missed. A few flowering shrubs were profuse in this area, Red Elderberry, Twinberry, and Raspberry.

We then climbed up through a somewhat less flowered portion of the forest composed primarily of Lodgepole Pine with a few scattered Rock Cresses. However, moving out on to a beautiful south-facing slope of scattered aspen and Ponderosa we chanced upon another group of flowers including Nodding Onion, Whiskbroom Parsley, Black-eyed Susan, Pearly Everlasting, Western Wallflower, and Tall Penstemon. A favorite of mine here was Blue Mist Penstemon whose name captures the ambience created by a whole patch of these vividly blue flowers growing all together.
